Both book return slots are open now that the ice has cleared from the back of the building. The upper return remains open all year, as does the one in Bala. We still continue to quarantine returned items for 72 hours so do not worry if you see items on your library record that you know you have returned within the last few days. Any overdue fines accrued during the quarantine time are removed once we check the items in. A welcome bit of news for all of you that borrow children's items: the board has passed a motion to waive overdue fines on children's items returned late. Items will still show as overdue in your record though, and we do appreciate promptness in returns, but we felt it may have been an unnecessary burden on families to have fines placed on items that are for children.

Another improvement that you will notice once we open our doors to in-library browsing (<u>not until our region is in at least the Orange level</u>) is the addition of a water bottle refill station, on the lower level of the Port Carling branch, purchased through the generosity of <u>The Friends of the Library</u>.
